It is with great pleasure that I invite you to the Galerie de la Prévôté in the heart of Aix-en-Provence to explore the artwork of our 2023 MFA graduates, and to celebrate their accomplishments. The MFA Exhibition this year features seven artists connected by their studies at the ACM School of Art, situated in the hometown of Cézanne. These artists have completed a unique, two-year MFA program in painting, which combined studio work and painting en plein air, aesthetic seminars, art history courses, museum studies, field studies, and four incorporated week-long working trips to paint in Annecy and Venice, as well as museum internship and teaching assistant opportunities.

The first-year MFA program is structured around the Marchutz Core Art Program, a "school of vision" led by studio art professors, Pauline Betrancourt and O'Neill Cushman, which develops the students' capacity to see and paint from the visible world. In addition to the daily discipline of creating art, the students took courses in French, art history and a dedicated 'Masters Forum.' In their second year, the MFA candidates enhanced their education in art history, and explored liberal, critical and Mediterranean studies. Independently, they built their individual artistic path from the rich foundation they shared. As this selection of paintings makes clear, each artist has realized their own vision and artistic style, or as we say it in French their own 'touche.'

On behalf of President Carl Jubran and the whole ACM/IAU community I congratulate the MFA class of 2023, and it is our collective honor to present you with a selection of works produced by this diverse, talented group of artists.



How do you experience nature, the human form, spaces that often go unnoticed? Does your gaze see the pieces or the whole, the vastness, color, light and shade? Take a journey with ACM's MFA students as they share their sight and insight into themselves and the world around them. Notice the use of paint and the emotions it evokes. Contemplate the paintings of these artists, only a sample of which are displayed in the gallery, and in this catalogue.

During their time at ACM, each of these students engaged us in a conversation with a distinct and individual voice. The artworks they created document the ever evolving and unpredictable journeys of individual artists pursuing knowledge, understanding, and fulfillment. What a privilege it was to experience the development of each of ACM's MFA students this semester. I share in the excitement they all feel as they welcome you to their MFA exhibition.

Congratulations to the MFA class of 2023—we look forward to witnessing your future successes!






Dreamscape Oil painting on canvas 50cm x 61cm


COLIN LYNCH



My self-portraits explore my corporeality and the self, and I purposefully reclaim traditional feminine iconography to subvert conventional narratives.




Self-Portrait Oil Painting on canvas 210cm x 116cm




Hair Dying Oil Painting on canvas 205cm x 118cm



Rue Constantine Oil pastel on paper 65cm x 50cm




La Cathédrale Oil Painting on canvas 65cm x 50cm

MARCIA MASON SPEECE





SARAH WILLIS Painting has become a representation of both my physical self and my subconscious mind. I wanted to explore the freedom of abstract expressionism while finding a sense of control through illustration. My experience with abstraction taught me how to express feeling and passion in my work but I found it to be too ambiguous at times. Discovering harmony between the expression of bold brushstrokes and restraint of details is key in the creation of my works. I find self-portraiture to be the best way to demonstrate this.

Self-portraiture creates an intimate and personal composition, and I continuously create sketches of a single self-portrait to truly understand and reflect on the image before me. I work from photographs rather than real life to remove myself from absolute realism and focus on the atmosphere and unity of the entire painting. This allows my paintings to reflect not my physical self, but my mind as well. My art reveals parts of myself that I cannot do with words.
